PREFACE

The following is an excerpt from my novel *The Garden of Broken Things* that illustrates the experiences of many machann (market vendors) in Haiti, specifically my late grandmother's hometown of Croix-des-Bouquets. In America, I was amazed at how my grandmother would adroitly balance a bag of groceries on her head the way she'd carried her panyé (basket) on her way back for the maché (open-air market) in Port-au-Prince. She would often tell me about the long treks from home to Maché Croix Bosal, a market known for its disarray, muddy dirty ground, and sweaty crowds. There she would sell and then buy what she needed for the night's meal if she made a few goud (Haitian currency) or return home with whatever she hadn't sold and figure out how to stretch that to feed her six children.

Most of the women characters in this novel are fictionalized versions of women like my grandmother, aunts, and my own mother who even when pregnant would make the arduous trip to the maché. These are the survivors of the 2010 earthquake and numerous natural and man-made catastrophes that are the foundation of my novel.

One of the main characters, Ateya whose name translates to "the ground," travels the jagged path that the women in my family had trod – panyé on their heads, strong necks, straight spines, perfect posture, pride intact – walking and working towards a better life.

IAteyal searched for the shaky stand where she'd sold her mother's goods as a child. She saw what she wanted to see, her mind creating visions of known comforting things. A row of small tines of evaporated milk, one-pound bags of rice, strings of dried smoked herring, salted cod, sachets of assorted grains – barley, millet, wheat, ground corn of varying degrees of coarseness: quarter kernel for smoked pork and kidney-bean stew, a mealy texture for polenta, and powdery for sweet porridge. An assortment of hair products – relaxers, dyes, and straighteners, oils to grease the scalp, and multiuse petroleum jelly as a primer for a hot press, a cure for ashy skin, a gloss for cracked lips...

Ateya's body remembered the eight-mile journey to Port-au-Prince that had frequently taken with her mother until she was old enough to go alone. Mother and daughter would walk to the capital and take a tap-tap back home with their parcels of goods, if there was money left. On the days when they went to pick up remittances, her mother would insist on the repayment of a loan from a borrower in the yard for carfare to the city. When she returned, she would lend more to that debtor who served as a bank from which she could make withdrawals at will.

This is what I see when I think of the struggling women in Haiti trying to make ends meet — the very women Fonkoze accompanies on the path to financial independence. I can only imagine what more my grandmother would have achieved had the organization existed in her day. As it were, she used whatever limited means she had to send six children to school in Haiti. Not wanting her children to grow up illiterate like herself, she funded their education until two of them completed graduate degrees in the US. Thanks to her, grandchildren like myself who were born on the dirt floor of an adobe hut, reached the pinnacle of academia with a doctorate degree. I am an author not only because of her foresight and sacrifices but also her life story that has inspired the characters in *The Garden of Broken Things*. She planted seeds in hard broken ground, sought scarce water, and nurtured a garden of flourishing progeny, one of whom would eventually write the preface dedicated to her and the thousands of women like her — fam vanyan, poto mitan, neges tet mare sere — exquisite hard-working women deserving of more than this small tribute.

2023 **OVERVIEW**



Fonkoze, a family of three interconnected organizations, is uniquely positioned to address Haiti's complex needs through a grassroots, sustainable approach:

Fonkoze Financial Services (SFF) spearheads financial inclusion initiatives in Haiti's remote areas, extending crucial financial services to underserved communities.

Fonkoze Foundation ventures even deeper into the countryside, reaching the most isolated communal sections where access is extremely challenging. Here, the Foundation focuses on two critical missions:

- **a)** Providing essential developmental services to the ultra-poor.
- **b)** Accompanying women living in ultra and extreme poverty, empowering them to lift themselves out of destitution through comprehensive support and crucial services.

This tripartite structure is completed by **Fonkoze USA**, which concentrates its efforts on resource mobilization. It offers crucial assistance to the Foundation and SFF, guaranteeing that they have the means to continue and grow their significant work in Haiti.

This integrated approach allows Fonkoze to deliver a comprehensive solution, from basic financial services to intensive poverty alleviation programs, while ensuring a steady flow of resources. By reaching into the heart of rural Haiti and maintaining strong international support, Fonkoze creates a robust ecosystem for sustainable development and economic empowerment, even in the most marginalized communities.



FONKOZE FINANCIAL SERVICES

In the fiscal year of 2023, ending September 30th, Sèvis Finansye Fonkoze, S.A. (Fonkoze Financial Services), continued its mission of economic empowerment across Haiti through its 46 nationwide branches. This dedicated institution fueled microcfinance access and financial stability of tens of thousands of Haitians, predominantly in rural regions, through a robust array of financial services.

LOANS: More than **48,000** ambitious clients received the financial boost needed to expand their businesses. With tailored loans varying in size and duration to meet diverse needs:



SAVINGS: Fonkoze welcomed **152,000** savings clients, spanning from first-time savers to established businesses, schools, churches, and NGOs, accumulating:

\$28.2 million in savings

MONEY TRANSFERS: : As personal remittances constitute 24% of Haiti's GDP, Fonkoze's role in facilitating international money transfers is crucial. Additionally, the "Mon Cash" service—a mobile phone-based domestic money transfer platform—proved indispensable for many clients, resulting in:

\$38.8 million in transfers **268,621** successful transactions

CURRENCY EXCHANGE: Acknowledging the dual currency system of US Dollars (USD) and Haitian Gourdes (HTG) in Haiti, Fonkoze's currency exchange services provided clients with seamless transactions amounting to:

\$3.6 million in foreign exchange transactions

PAYROLL MANAGEMENT: Fonkoze supported nonprofit and international organizations by ensuring smooth and regular payroll cycles.

CLEMENCE JEAN: SHARES HER WISDOM WITH OTHERS

Clemence Jean, a 69-year-old entrepreneur from Wanament, has been a loyal Fonkoze client since the mid-2000s. Clemence first heard about Fonkoze through a friend and decided to attend a credit center meeting. Inspired by the loan officers and other clients, she decided to apply for a loan.

Before joining Fonkoze, Clemence had a very small business with limited inventory. Her first loan of HTG 1,500 allowed her to expand her stock. Over the years, she has taken over a dozen loans, using the funds to grow her business significantly. Today, Clemence owns two businesses: a food supply store managed by her youngest son and a wholesale fabric store she manages herself. The access to financing from Fonkoze has enabled her to diversify her business portfolio and open a second store.

Clemence's journey with Fonkoze has not been without challenges. She recalls a difficult period when bandits stole HTG 1.2M worth of merchandise. Despite this significant loss, Clemence continued to make regular loan payments, remaining committed to her business.

The biggest skill Clemence has gained from Fonkoze is money management. She now understands her cash flow and ensures she always has enough funds to purchase more inventory and

repay her loans. Her business growth has made her a respected figure in her community. Clemence often attends credit center meetings to advise other Fonkoze clients, sharing her wisdom and experience.

The increased income from her businesses has allowed her to purchase a home and she also supports her community through in-kind donations, such as bags of rice, and contributions to her church.

Clemence hopes to open a third business selling drinks, further diversifying her portfolio. She remains optimistic and motivated, crediting Fonkoze for the ease of receiving loans, the professional advice from loan officers, and the overall support from the organization.

She continues encouraging other aspiring entrepreneurs to invest their loans wisely in their businesses.

STAFF STORY

LAURENT BRUTUS LOUIS: A PILLAR OF SUPPORT AT FONKOZE



Laurent Brutus Louis, known as Choubouloute or Choubou, has been a steadfast presence at Fonkoze Financial Services for 17 years. Serving as support staff at the headquarters in Port-au-Prince, Laurent's dedication and resilience have made him an invaluable member of the team.

His typical day at Fonkoze includes cleaning the yard, unloading stock, and assisting other staff members with various tasks. His commitment ensures the office operates smoothly.

The most rewarding aspect of Laurent's job is the appreciation received from his colleagues. Laurent shares that he takes pride in being of service and knowing his efforts are valued. His dedication was particularly evident after the 2010 earthquake. With the headquarters damaged, Fonkoze continued serving clients from the yard, including handling cash-based services. Laurent's took on the job of retrieving cash from a secure location and bringing it to the Branch Director for counting—a significant responsibility he handled diligently.

DEDICATED AND MOTIVATED

Working in a high-risk environment is one of Laurent's biggest challenges. Since the headquarters was forced to close in

March, he alternates between the old office and a temporary emergency office. The streets are often empty when he arrives and leaves, making it stressful due to the increased danger. Laurent overcomes these challenges by being cautious and observant.

Laurent says his job has allowed him to send his four children to school and provide for them. The mission of Fonkoze holds personal significance for him, as he has witnessed its positive impact on his family and community.

A MESSAGE TO SUPPORTERS

Laurent extends his heartfelt gratitude to the supporters of Fonkoze. He asks for their continued support and prayers for strength and courage as Fonkoze works tirelessly to uplift the community in Haiti. His story is a testament to each staff member's critical role in the organization's mission to empower the people of Haiti.

FONKOZE FOUNDATION **DEVELOPMENT SERVICES**

CLM

Fondasyon Kole Zepòl (Fonkoze Foundation) directly touched the lives of 84,362 clients in 2023.

Chemen Lavi Miyò (CLM or Pathway to a Better Life): CLM empowers Haitians living in the deepest levels of poverty to lift themselves out of ultra - poverty by providing the skills and the tools that they need to improve their futures. CLM is an 18-month program that accompanies families to emerge from poverty by providing income-generating assets, a cash stipend, and the skills, knowledge, and confidence to grow their assets. At the end of the CLM graduation program, the women have at least two forms of income-generating activities, a proven ability to grow their wealth, a home with a roof, and a latrine of their own.

Ultra and Extreme Poverty: Fonkoze's Chemen Lavi Miyò (CLM) program offers different services to women in ultra-poverty and extreme poverty, tailoring its approach to fit their specific needs.

For women in ultra-poverty, the program focuses on intensive support, providing the basic necessities and guidance needed to build a foundation for a better life. For those in extreme poverty, the program offers tools and resources to stabilize and improve their situations, preventing them from slipping further into destitution. This dual approach ensures that all families in a community can receive the right level of support to achieve sustainable progress.



Since CLM first began in 2007, the graduation rate has consistently been 95%. However, the program depends on a specific series of steps that are completed in 18 months. Due to recent circumstances in Haiti, we've encountered some delays that have made it more challenging to stick to our timeline. As a result, the graduation rate has dipped slightly, but we remain committed to helping our participants succeed.



STAFF STORY

ISLANDE LEONIS: CLM CASE MANAGER

Islande Leonis, a dedicated Fonkoze Case Manager based in Cange, has been with Fonkoze for five years. Her typical day involves verifying enterprises, teaching members literacy and numeracy, discussing family matters, planning for the future, and checking the health of beneficiaries. Leonis was inspired to join Fonkoze by its impactful work in transforming lives, a mission she finds commendable and motivating.

One of Leonis' most memorable experiences was during a malnutrition screening in a border area. Many children were severely malnourished, and local health centers were unable to help. Leonis went above and beyond by finding another hospital willing to admit these children, staying with them throughout their treatment. "I am happy that many lives have been saved and we do not know what these children will become for the country," she shares.

Leonis highlights the unique reach of Fonkoze: "The clients are very happy for the service because only Fonkoze reaches the remote areas and reaches the forgotten people." Her commitment to the community is evident in her efforts to reach her clients and ensure they get the medical care they need.

For Leonis, Fonkoze's mission is personal. She states, "My love for the people I work with means that problems and obstacles mean nothing to me." This dedication drives her to continue making a positive impact in the lives of the people she serves.

ZONE FONKOZE REFERS TO AREAS IN HAITI WHERE EDUCATION, CLM, AND BOUTIK SANTE ARE COMBINED.

VSLAS AND LONG-TERM SUCCESS:

With insecurity impacting the women's daily lives, a key highlight of 2023 is increasing the number of Village Savings and Loan Associations we work with to 253. In addition, Fonkoze's staff has developed a new approach designed to help the VSLAs maintain themselves. It trains VSLA specialists in the communities where it establishes the associations. These specialists are available as technical advisors to the VSLAs after the CLM team moves on. After graduating from CLM, more women are joining VSLAs and help women maintain their progress.



YVROSE: THE ENCOURAGEMENT NEEDED

Yvrose's journey is one of resilience and transformation. Just 18 months ago, she, her husband Jean Gaby, and their three children were living in the kitchen of a church with nothing to their name. But in January, she graduated with 82,000 gourds (approximately US\$630) in savings.

When Yvrose joined the CLM program, her Fonkoze case manager, Figaro, emphasized the importance of having a dry, secure home. Despite some initial skepticism, Figaro's words, "If you start,

you'll finish. Just start," resonated with her. With determination, Yvrose and Jean Gaby built a solid three-room home, from her savings and loan association, totaling 45,000 gourds. Jean Gaby collected sand from a local riverbed to reduce costs.

To repay the loans and manage daily expenses, Yvrose initially relied on the livestock provided by CLM. However, she soon ventured into commerce, borrowing 15,000 gourds to buy produce from local farmers and resell it to wholesalers. Political unrest disrupted this business, but Yvrose remained undeterred. She participated in a new CLM workshop where she learned to make and package snack foods from plantains, peanuts, and coconut. Investing her 30,000 gourds of business capital into this new venture, her products quickly gained popularity.

Looking ahead, Yvrose plans to add another room to her house and invest in livestock to eventually be able to purchase more land. Her journey is a testament to her resilience and the transformative power of Fonkoze's CLM program.

PREVENTATIVE **HEALTH INITIATIVE**

Boutik Sante, Fonkoze's award winning social franchising health initiative, brings essential health products, education, and services to rural Haiti.

Fonkoze's team of registered nurses train female microfinance clients to become Community Health Entrepreneurs (CHEs). These CHEs conduct health screenings, deliver health education sessions, and procure health products from Fonkoze to resell in their communities, generating additional income for themselves and their communities. CHEs also play a crucial role in identifying community members most in need of Fonkoze services. The dedication of these women and the support from Fonkoze ensure that even in tough times, essential health services reach those who need them most.

Boutik Sante faced its most challenging year in 2023, causing us to reduce operations from 31 to 12 branches. The teams navigated roadblocks, fuel shortages, supply chain shortages and increased transportation costs with resilience and determination. The staff and leadership remain committed to adapting and overcoming the situational challenges. We can estimate that each CHE provides access to her products to around 300 households, or 1,500 persons on average, for a total number of persons with access to the products of 673,500 persons.

Fonkoze also provides other health services to these communities through grant-funded projects including screenings and referrals for malnutrition and hypertension.



LOOKING FORWARD

HPV Screenings

Fonkoze is working with local partners to launch a program that will empower women to self-test for human papillomavirus (HPV), the primary cause of cervical cancers. Those who test positive will have access to the necessary treatment.



STAFF STORY

NURSE THÉAGENE MARIE GUIVELINE: AT THE HEART OF FONKOZE'S HEALTH PROGRAM

Théagene Marie Guiveline has been a Fonkoze Field Nurse for five years. She starts her workday at 8 o'clock, balancing office duties with fieldwork. She supervises health screenings, provides medical support, and cares for malnourished children. "The reactions of the people I serve mean a lot to me. It makes me proud when I feel satisfied with my work," she says with a smile.

Théagene remembers a parent thanking her for saving their malnourished child's life and another client being happy about supporting their family by selling products from the Boutik Sante health shop. These moments keep her motivated during these challenging times.

Despite the dangers in Haiti, Théagene is committed. She finds ways to get health products to the community, even if it means taking longer, safer routes to avoid gangs. During severe supply shortages, she procures products from different regions and personally delivers them to her branches.

Communities rely on Boutik Sante for health supplies and preventative services. Clients often ask when Fonkoze will return to areas where services have stopped, sharing how important Fonkoze is to their lives. Théagene remembers her time in the Port-Margot branch, where community radio broadcasts promoted Boutik Sante and the strong support and participation that followed.

Théagene's motivation comes from her love for her job and the joy of helping those in need. She carefully plans her work to balance her job and personal life. She is driven by Fonkoze's mission to change lives, especially the lives of women. She hopes to recieve more trainings and skills to help even more in the fight against poverty.

If Fonkoze can change the lives of many people and the work is not finished. There are still many people who are suffering and waiting for help. Continuing to support Fonkoze is to give opportunities and a lot of other people hope for a better future.





CAPACITY BUILDING: ADULT EDUCATION

The introduction of EdTek has expanded the scope and reach of Fonkoze's adult education program through the introduction of tablet-based learning. Educational topics include critical modules on disaster preparedness, environmental protection, sexual health, business development, community solidarity, and more.

Access to quality education in Haiti faces significant challenges such as poverty, political instability, inadequate infrastructure, and gender disparities. To address these issues, Fonkoze developed the EdTek application, which provides engaging and culturally relevant educational content. Given that over 55% of Fonkoze's clients live on less than \$2.50 USD per day and over 40% are illiterate, the app is crucial in delivering accessible educational resources and is accessible regardless of literacy. The EdTek app aims to promote essential life skills such as disaster risk reduction, environmental protection, sexual health, business development, financial planning, and community solidarity, as well as enhance digital literacy. It also fosters positive behavior changes by using engaging narratives and stories that reflect Haitian life. EdTek seeks to improve financial literacy, encourage economic autonomy, and promote inclusivity by delivering content in Haitian Creole.

Designed for sustainability, Fonkoze intends to expand EdTek's reach beyond Fonkoze's Credit Centers in the future by making modules available for a small fee. EdTek addresses immediate educational needs while laying the groundwork for sustainable development, thus positioning itself as a transformative force in Haiti's journey towards a brighter future.



MADAME MELIDA BOUCHER: THE TRANSFORMATIVE POWER OF EDTEK

Madame Melida Boucher, a 53-year-old mother of five who makes her living as a timachann, or little market woman, began losing her vision in 1983 due to a progressive eye condition. By 2007, her vision was completely gone. Melida doesn't let her condition slow down her dreams. She manages her own business with the help of her son.

As a client of the Ti Rivye de Nip Fonkoze Branch, Melida participated in the EdTek program. Her blindness did not stop her from engaging with the modules.

The module on environmental protection especially resonated with her. "I used to throw away plastic bottles, but thanks to EdTek, I know I can make brooms from them and sell them," she shared.

Supported by friends and family, Melida attends sessions to complete EdTek modules. She listens to stories on tablets and memorizes key points. "I listen to the stories to find the right answers," she says, highlighting the support of her Fonkoze monitor, Ciadelle Detend.

Melida is particularly fond of a story from the business development module. "This story shows you how to manage a business well and make progress," she noted. The program also encouraged her to discuss important topics like sexual health with her children.

Despite her visual impairment, Melida's active participation in EdTek has equipped her with invaluable knowledge and skills, transforming her life and business.



BOUJONNEN LAVI

Fonkoze Foundation combined its Health, Human Capacity Development, and Chemin Lavi Miyo (CLM) programs in the Boujonnen Lavi project, which is sponsored by USAID. The project aims to protect the dignity of families affected by the 2021 earthquake and reduce food insecurity and malnutrition in the South Department of Haiti by promoting economic resilience and self-sufficiency for vulnerable households. Boujonnen Lavi promotes positive behavioral changes, resilience, and economic autonomy for thousands of households.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

Malnutrition Screening and Treatment:

- 28,619 children under 5 and 3,335 pregnant/nursing women were screened for malnutrition.
- 498 malnourished children identified (1.7% of those screened).
- 85% of malnourished children are either in treatment or cured.
- 12,363 cholera kits distributed.

Economic Empowerment and Support:

- 3,800 households received cash transfers to improve their food security.
- 45 Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLAs) were established, with 3,711 participants (91% women), saving close to 52 million gourdes and providing over 45 million gourdes in credit during their annual cycle.
- 6,753 clients completed digital education modules.



JEAN DANISON AFTER
HIS RECOVERY FROM
MALNUTRITION THANKS
TO HELP AND ACCESS



Nanotte Régis, a 30-year-old mother from Major in Torbeck, Haiti, lives with her husband and four children, including little Jean Danison Régis, just 15 months old. Despite their hard work as small-scale farmers, they often face the harsh reality of food insecurity, sometimes managing only one meal a day.

On May 7, 2023, Fonkoze held a malnutrition screening for children and pregnant and nursing women in Major. During this event, Marie France François, a dedicated Boutik Sante owner, noticed that Danison was suffering from moderate acute malnutrition. She immediately referred him to the Mersan clinic in Camp Perrin. Fonkoze stepped in to provide transportation, ensuring that the treatment was truly free for the family.

Nanotte, driven by her love and determination, attended every single hospital appointment. Her dedication paid off as, after four months of treatment, Danison made a remarkable recovery by the end of September 2023. Nurse Margareth Bien Aime from Fonkoze confirmed his restored health, much to Nanotte's immense relief and joy.

Seeing her son with a healthy appetite and thriving again. Her heart swelled with gratitude, knowing that Fonkoze's support had given her son a second chance at life.

OpEco

The Economic Opportunities Program (OpEco) encompasses three key activities aimed at fostering economic resilience and self-sufficiency among vulnerable households in Haiti. Through these initiatives, the Economic Opportunities Project aims to create sustainable economic growth and improve the livelihoods of vulnerable communities in Haiti.

DEVELOPMENT OF A VSLA ACCOUNTING APPLICATION

To address the challenges faced by Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLAs) in managing finances, Fonkoze is working with the Grameen Foundation to adapt its phone-based application LedgerLink to the Haitian reality. The LedgerLink app simplifies transaction recording, ensuring transparency and reducing fraud risks. After successful desk-testing in 2023, the application is expected to be rolled out in the next year.

PRODUCTIVE USE OF ELECTRICITY

100 entrepreneurs develop businesses through the use of electric appliances. Initially launched in the South, the project expanded to Marchand Dessalines in collaboration with Alina Energies. By the end of the year, 25 contracts were signed for appliance distribution, supporting ventures such as rice mills and electric motorcycles. These efforts aim to boost economic activity in areas with limited access to reliable electricity.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

A cross-program research and development effort is underway to enhance the impact and efficiency of Fonkoze's initiatives. This includes data collection and the development of innovative solutions to support economic growth and resilience.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- VSLA Application: Ready for implementation in 2024, enhancing financial transparency and reducing fraud risks.
- Electric Appliance Distribution: 25 contracts signed in Marchand Dessalines to support new business ventures.
- Business Model Testing: Initiated pilot projects for rice mills and electric motorcycles to assess viability and impact.
- 40 entrepreneurs received training and coaching to improve their businesses using productive use of electricity appliances through the OpEco program.

Murline and Her Freezer

Fonkoze works with local partners to facilitate getting entrepreneurs like Murline Gedeon equipment to sustain their microbusinesses. She shares, "Before I had a freezer I had to go to another small area to buy supplies. Now not only can I have it at home, but everyone in the area can find soft drinks and natural juices available when they need them. It allows me to make more money to live better with my family."

SFF FINANCIALS

Fiscal year 2023 was extremely difficult for Fonkoze and Haiti. The country was economically paralyzed from mid-September through October and November as gangs prevented fuel distribution. Clients have been properly cautious with borrowing, and loan portfolio growth has been slow. Clients are struggling to repay loans resulting in Loan Loss provisions above historical levels. And we incur higher expenses to provide adequate security for all employees, particularly with respect to cash distribution. The combined result of all these adverse developments is that for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2023, Fonkoze S.A. together with its subsidiary Sèvis Finansye Fonkoze, S.A. ("SFF") incurred a Net Loss of HTG 109.3 million (equivalent to \$775,645 at average exchange rates during the year).

In this adverse and frequently dangerous environment, SFF is committed to providing working conditions as safe as possible for all employees while maintaining the highest level of client service. This has led to the temporary closing of two branches and the need to reduce services in certain "Red Zone" branches. SFF has also implemented a decentralization plan to improve worker safety. We have also become a direct agent for Western Union money transfer services; we are installing solar panels at each branch; and we have upgraded our computer and IT systems. The biggest challenge was to supply our branches with cash. Rural areas still use physical money. This has also slowed down cash distribution contracts (payroll management).

FOUNDATION FINANCIALS

I am pleased to present Fonkoze Kole Zepol statement of Accounts for the year ending 31st of December 2023. The Statement aims to provide information to all stakeholders and shareholders so that they can:

- Understand the overall financial position of the Foundation for 2022/23.
- Have confidence that the Foundation has used and accounted for donors' funds in an appropriate manner.
- Be assured that the financial position of the Foundation is sound and secure.

The pressures on the Foundation services will continue to rise and the future financial position of Fonkoze will be dependent on its ability to manage demand with reducing resources and finding ways to increase revenues through other activities such as Boutik Sante.

Although there is significant uncertainty about the level of funding the Foundation will receive beyond 2022/23, the Foundation was able to build reserves as a cushion at year-end for \$ 307,793.89, equivalent to the exchange rate listed on the statement of accounts. The reserves have further increased in 2022/23 compared to 2021/22.

Our cash position significantly reduced at the end of the year due to an increase in expenditure outlay, but we were still able to increase our donor receivables and decrease our short-term and long-term liabilities through economic hardship and socio-political unrest.

Several projects are now delivering at a pace, with effective project management in place to deliver future projects, savings, and efficiencies. Means of funding the various projects are in place, and an increase in donors' funds is in perspective for the year 2024.

The Foundation is looking forward to continuing its program expenses to significantly increase the quality of life of extremely impoverished families.
